### **Project Specifications**

Skill Level: Beginner

Candle Mat Size: 18" x 18"


Block Size: 9" x 9"

### **Fabric & Batting**

- ¼ yard small pink print on dark green background
- 4 yard medium pink flower print on dark background
- ½ yard medium pink print on yellow background
- ➢ Backing 22" x 22"
- ➣ Thin batting 22" x 22"

### **Supplies & Tools**

- Rotary-cutting tools
- All-purpose thread to blend with fabrics
- Natural quilting thread



Garden Pathways 9" x 9" Block

#### **Instructions**

 Use A template to cut 16 each medium pink flower print on dark background, medium green print, and small pink print on dark green background.



Reverse template to AR and cut the same number of the same templates reversed.

- 2. From medium pink flower print on dark background, cut 16 rectangles 1½" x 5½" for B. From medium pink print on yellow background, cut 16 rectangles 1½" x 3½" for C and four squares 3½" x 3½" for E. From small pink print on dark green background, cut 16 squares 1½" x 1½".
- **3.** Sew A and AR (medium pink flower print on dark background) to each D as shown in Figure 1.

**4.** Sew A and AR (medium green print) to each C piece as shown in Figure 2.



Sew A & AR to each side of C.

**5.** Sew A and AR (small pink print on dark green background) to each B piece as shown in Figure 3.

**6.** Join the strips made in steps 2–4 into one unit as shown in Figure 4. Sew one unit to each side of each E piece to make one Garden Pathways block. Repeat for four blocks.





- **7.** Join four blocks as shown in Placement Diagram.
- **8.** Prepare for quilting as shown in General Instructions. Quilt as desired by hand or machine.
- 9. From medium pink print on yellow background, cut and piece enough 1½"-wide strips to make 2¼ yards of binding as shown in General Instructions. Bind candle mat to finish. ❖





# General Instructions

# **Cutting & Piecing**

Many of the pieces for the candle mats in this book may be quick-cut using a quilter's acrylic ruler and a rotary cutter. Others have irregular shapes and will require templates. Trace the template shapes on clear plastic template material and cut out on traced lines.

Some pieces have a mirror image and need to be reversed when cutting. Instructions will be given for the number of pieces to be cut with the traced template. You will then be instructed to reverse (turn over) the template to trace the reversed pieces.

Follow pattern instructions for assembling the blocks.

## **Marking**

Any quilting designs should be marked on the quilt top before it is layered with backing and batting. A sharp, medium-lead pencil may be used on light background fabrics. Test the pencil marks to be sure they will wash out when quilting is complete, or be sure that your quilting stitches cover the line. Mechanical pencils with very fine points may also be used successfully to mark quilts.

Whatever marking tool you use should never show on the finished quilt.

Most of the designs in this book are quilted in the ditch and will require no marking.

### Layering

Backing fabric and batting are usually cut slightly larger than the quilt top. The Fabric & Batting list will give suggested sizes for each project.

Place the backing wrong side up on a flat work surface. Place the batting on the backing and smooth it carefully. Place the pieced top on the batting and carefully smooth.

To hold the layers together for quilting, baste by hand or use safety pins. Safety pins work especially well for machine quilting.

Quilting may be done by hand or by machine in the design of your choice.

### **Binding**

Trim the backing and batting layers flush with the top of the candle mat.

Double-fold, straight-grain binding may be successfully

used on most of the small projects in this book.

Cut the selected fabric in 1½"-wide strips on the straight grain of the fabric. Join the strips as shown in Figure 1 to make binding of sufficient length.



Join binding strips in a diagonal seam as shown.

Fold the binding lengthwise, wrong sides facing, and press.

Several quilts in this book have curved edges and bias binding is recommended. Make the binding the same as above, but cut the 1½"-wide strips on the bias instead of on the straight grain.

Pin the folded binding along one edge of the quilt, starting in the middle of one side and aligning the raw edges. Stitch, with a walking foot if you have one, to within ¼" of the first corner; backstitch.

Turn the quilt; fold the binding at a 45-degree angle up and away from the quilt as shown in Figure 2. Fold the binding back down, flush with the raw edge of the quilt as shown in Figure 3. Repeat at each corner as you stitch around the quilt.

As you approach the beginning of the binding strip, stop stitching and overlap the binding ½" from the edge; trim. Join the two ends with a ¼" seam allowance and press the seam open. Reposition the joined binding along the edge of the quilt and resume stitching to the beginning.



Fold binding at a 45-degree angle up and away from quilt.



the raw edges of the quilt and blind-stitch the folded edge of the binding in place over the machine-stitching line of the backside. ❖



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
